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Kia ora e te whānau

I don't know if many of you remember back in the old days when you used to bring your marbles to bubblegum cards to school to trade, but I do. There were always those kids who were real good at negotiating, those kids who didn't have siblings so they had heaps more doubles than you, and those times when your valuables went 'missing.' All of those experiences contributed to skills I use today, they helped me learn to take care of precious cargo, how to deal with the loss of things, how to negotiate and how to trade. There were definitely tears and definitely those 'I want it back' moments, but adults back then stuck to the principles of trade and made me stronger for it. Nobody was going to question Mrs Betts at my school, she was the most understanding teacher we had, and she helped us understand what keeping your word was and how to be smart about getting what we wanted.

So, when the new Woolworths collectible cards came out I thought this was an opportunity I couldn't pass up. Historically, we have banned students from bringing small tradeable items to school in an attempt to prevent the tears, the arguments, and the injustices felt by students, however I believe that those experiences are imperative for the development of resilience that our students so badly need. It is for this reason I am introducing '**Friday Trade Day**.' Friday Trade Day is a day when students can bring in small collectibles to trade during break times only. The items can be no bigger than a collectible card. Marbles, BeyBlades, Pokemon Cards and other such types of collectibles are acceptable.

At assembly this Friday I explained (with the support of Mrs Calman's acting skills) how trades work. I advised that once a trade is agreed upon it cannot be reversed without the agreement of both parties, even if one of the people are crying. Trades are **only** to be made during break times on a Friday, if a student is caught trading in class their items will be conviscated for a week. Students need to take care of their own items, I will not be expecting teachers to launch full scale investigations for valuables that go missing.

Lessons I hope students learn:

- 1. Take care of valuables.
- 2. Understand what others value.
- 3. Negotiating skills.
- 4. Know how to hear the word 'no.'
- 5. The value of being patient to get an end goal.

Lots may not agree with the idea of trading at school, but I can't help but think that our children are continually missing out on great learning that doesn't happen without some experience. No one is losing their home, car, or income in this experience, so please help your children learn through these experiences. If you do not wish for your child to participate, then don't let them bring their items to school. I will be bringing my small collection of cards to trade with my friends, I hope I get my collection!
